From the Superintendent...

As we near the end of the school year, we want to thank all of those who volunteered or took an active role in helping our students to be successful in their academics. It makes the job of educating all students easier with the help of so many dedicated people.

The fourth nine-weeks brought with it the assessment of students through state testing. Like previous years, we will be testing our students electronically. Staff have been working to provide intervention and testing strategies to enhance the student's opportunities on the test. We continue to work on our Four Pillars to Success, which have provided us a road map to improvement. You can review the four pillars on our website.

We are currently in the process of getting a new bus garage built. The replacement of that building will provide our transportation department a facility that will work on all of our buses. Another exciting addition will be offering a pilot program for preschool for next school year. The program will have thirty-two seats available for those students who are primarily in need of special education services. We will fill the remainder of seats with general education students. This will provide us a starting point for the future of preschool services. The "Leader in Me" program will be starting in the fall for our elementary students and staff. This program will utilize Stephen Covey's characteristics for highly effective students.

We look forward to continuing the collaboration we have built with a number of parents, businesses, and community members with our community engagement activities. This year we provided information on social media, and hidden in plain sight programs. We believe these are worthwhile to provide information to everyone on common issues our community is facing.

We would also like to thank all of the parents and staff who attended the district "Think Tank" meetings. These meetings give us an opportunity to hear from our community and see where all of you would like our district to move. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you have ideas for the future. We are always looking for ways to improve the programs and lives of our students.

This is an exciting time for all of us. We will be introducing approximately 120 students to the world as graduates of North Fork Local Schools. This is the completion of thirteen years of education in our district, and potentially the beginning of further education for many. We would like to offer our congratulations and best wishes for all of those graduating.



Have a safe, relaxing summer!

After School Reading and Writing Club

Students practiced writing in response to more than one reading selection. Some writing was handwritten. Other writing selections completed by students were typed in the computer lab. **Thank you** parents for allowing your children to participate in this after school activity so we could practice what it takes to become **better readers and writers!**



Math Club 2017-2018

Math club is an informal way to promote mathematics that is fun and often outside the standards that we MUST learn. We often explore mathematics through architecture and engineering so we do a lot of building with different materials to examine stability and structure using angles. Each spring we celebrate Pi Day in March by measuring the circumference and diameter of round objects such as watermelon slices, cookies and orange slices. Then the students eat the materials! This year we added an old-fashioned game of monopoly to the mix to experience buying and selling properties and finished up using borrowed Zome materials to build interesting structures. The kids love the opportunity to learn through play, with less structure and no assessments to worry about!

Science Club

This year in **Science Club** we explored the world around us through the Magic School Bus Science Club Program. We averaged 20 students per meeting and met once a month. Students this year explored and created volcanoes, learned how white light is a mixture of all light colors with colored pin-wheels, grew bacteria in petri dishes to compare the effectiveness of hand sanitizer vs. hand soap, constructed constellation boxes with shoe boxes, and even made edible playdough! We are already looking forward to **Science Club** for the 2018-2019 school year.



Student Government

UE Student Government spent this year contributing to our local areas through fundraising and outreach! This year Student Government's first fundraiser was **Dance Out Homelessness**. Students paid one quarter and received a song sheet where they wrote a song choice, then at the end of each day we drew a song and played it over the PA system while the whole school stopped for a **dance break**. Through this we raised over \$250.00 for the Licking County Coalition for Housing. We were also able to raise \$2,500.00 for the **Leukemia and Lymphoma Society**, 75% of which went right back to patients and research here in Licking County! For the holidays, we packed shoeboxes to send to kids all around the world who needed some extra love. During Christmas we also held a candy gram sale which helped us raise over \$150.00 to order vinyl leadership quotes to hang throughout the school. Student Government consisted of 9 members, one student from each classroom, third through fifth grade.


We are closing in on the end of another fiscal year. Where does time go?

If you drive past the high school, you will notice most of our buses are sitting on the lot when not in use. That is because we have begun the long awaited bus garage project. What is exciting for me is that we are able to do this project with monies that we were able to set aside for this specific purpose. In your personal life – that would be the equivalent of purchasing a car with cash and not taking a loan out to make this purchase. What that means is the Board of Education is making wise financial decisions.

The Board is also being cognizant of our aging educational facilities. Currently, the board has earmarked some monies for emergency building/equipment repair needs. Preparing for the future, they have had the state come in to do a review of our middle school facility to help determine the best way to move forward. The state will be able to do some project cost projections to determine if it will be more cost efficient to update the current facilities or to build a new facility.

We will, once again, be ending the year with revenues exceeding expenditures, which will also help the Board to make financial decisions to benefit the district.


Utica High School Spring Art Show
