From the Superintendent ~

Can you believe we have almost made it through the first semester of the 2023-24 school year? I would like to express my many thanks to all who have made the start of the year so successful. As we continue into the second semester, we are focusing on our mission to facilitate maximum learning for every student. The district could not achieve improvement without the strong partnership we share with our students, staff and community. I want to thank each of you for doing your part to live our mission.

The district has had a busy and productive nine weeks. Literacy is the top goal this school year. We have made changes to help our students improve in reading and writing. 

Recently, when Theodore Moore was hospitalized, our staff and students organized a Penny Stall event, where students brought in spare change to help out Theo's family with medical expenses. Most recently when tragedy struck the Tuscarawas Schools and Community, our students and staff wore red and black to school, the Tuscarawas school colors, to show our support for them, letting them know that we too are #Tusky Valley Strong. For the Christmas season, our students participated in Operation Christmas Child and recently packaged 56 shoeboxes filled with a variety of items to give to children in need for Christmas.

A priority at Utica Middle School is preparing students for their future and exposing them to careers and career choices. Mrs. Julia Kelley, one of our counselors, recently provided a lesson to our 6th grade students, in which they filled out an interest inventory that matched their current skills with possible careers linked to those skills. On November 3rd, Dinah Rice, another one of our counselors, partnered with C-TEC, taking all of our 8th graders to C-TEC for the day to experience the range of programs they offer. It was a day filled with discovery as the students immersed themselves in the different career pathways. Currently, Mrs. Edinger and myself are planning with C-TEC and Robertson Construction to provide a career-based experience for our students to learn about the construction-trade. This opportunity will provide a connection with the academic content students are learning about in their current classes that is relevant to the construction trade.

One of the most exciting activities this Fall was our 7th grade outdoor education field trip. This event was a two-night sleep over at Heartland Conference Retreat center in Morrow County. The students actively participated in many outdoor learning activities including building a shelter to survive in the wilderness, learning how to shoot a bow and arrow and getting to learn about and hold various reptiles.

We have a great group of students and staff at Utica Middle School. What gives me the greatest satisfaction is hearing back from the people of the places our students visited and hearing how well behaved and respectful the students were outside of the school setting. This shows what a great job you as parents and our teachers are doing in preparing our children to be productive citizens as adults.

- Proof of residency (ie., utility bill, government mailing, rental or lease agreement, paystub)
- Copy of current IEP (if applicable)

Immunizations Required:

- 5 DTaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis)
- 4 POLIO
- 2 MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella)
- 3 HEP B (Hepatitis B)
- 2 Varicella
