From the Superintendent ~

We have reached the halfway point of the 2019-20 school year. With the beginning of the second semester, our staff will continue to engage our students academically. This is the critical point of the year to ensure we are on target for graduation, or earning the credits towards graduation. The second semester will also bring with it the completion of winter, state testing, and ultimately graduation for our seniors. This is an important part of the lives of all of our students.

We would like to welcome two new board members to the Board of Education, Andy Hollenback, and Jason Snyder. We also want to thank Lori Stradley and James Quinif for their dedication to the students of our district.

Although the weather has been very mild, at least to date, keep in mind that the winter is not over yet. As we face the upcoming forecasts, we will make the best decision we can concerning school closings, for all of our students' safety. We do have information on our webpage that explains how we make the decision to delay or close under the district tab. Always remember that as a parent you need to make the best decision on whether your children will be driving in weather that may be dicey.

State testing is coming upon us rapidly and the staff have been preparing students by reviewing past tests, looking for common items, and ensuring we are covering all of the areas needed for our students to be successful. Why are these tests so important? Current law requires students to take and pass all five subjects of the Ohio Graduation Tests (OGT) in order to earn an Ohio high school diploma. Students who do not pass one or more of the tests will retake the tests they need to pass. Parents, it is important that you stress to your student the importance of these tests. Without passing all five of the testing areas, or completing other pathways, the students will not be able to earn their diploma. The testing schedule is on our webpage so you know the dates when the tests will be administered.

We are grateful to you for allowing us to educate your students. As administrators, teachers, and support staff, we appreciate the time we can spend with all of the students in our care. By keeping our students focused on their academics, we can help every student meet the requirements necessary to graduate.

"I'm sick. Do I have to go to school today?"

When your child asks you that, wouldn't it be nice to be able to answer objectively? Well there are some **guidelines** to help parents make that decision. Dr. Maritza Irizarry, a pediatrician, says that "Although sometimes it seems very inconvenient and impractical for us as working parents, there are times when we have to keep our children out of school to protect them and others."

Children should stay home when they don't feel well enough to participate in normal activities or lack sufficient alertness to learn or play. Here are some definite guidelines:

- ♦ vomits twice or more over a 24 hour period
- ♦ registers an oral temperature greater than 100 degrees Fahrenheit (<u>Must be fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing meds to return to school per policy.</u>)
- has an uncontrollable, phlegm-laden cough
- ♦ has prolonged or serious difficulty breathing
- produces repeated bouts of diarrhea or bloody stools
- exhibits abdominal pain for more than two hours
- has open sores on the mouth
- displays a unknown skin rash
- shows symptoms of contagious diseases such as chickenpox, German measles, hepatitis, impetigo, measles, mumps, shingles, strep throat, or whooping cough. Children can receive vaccinations against some, but not all of these diseases.
- reddened eyes with swelling, itching, burning matter in eye and crust on eyelids
- becomes infested with head lice or scabies
- abrupt onset of fever, chills, headache and sore muscles and unusual tiredness
- sore throat with fever, red throat and pus spots on back of throat
- Ear infections aren't contagious, so if a child isn't in much pain, going to school is OK.

There are things we as parents can do to help. Kids Health, School Network for Absenteeism Prevention suggests:

- ◆ Teach your kids <u>when</u> and <u>how</u> to wash their hands. A thorough hand washing after going to the bathroom and before eating will cut down on colds, diarrhea and other common childhood illnesses.
- ♦ Teach your kids <u>not</u> to share certain items, that is. Sharing food is dangerous for others allergic to certain foods. Sharing water bottles, pens and other personal items spread germs. Lice are passed easily via hats and hair accessories.
- ♦ Communicate <u>current</u> information with your school office. Please make sure current phone numbers (home, work and cell) are available in the event that they must call you in an emergency. Communicate with the school nurse regarding any special health needs, either temporary or ongoing.
- ♦ Schedule annual physical exams and don't wait too long to make a doctor's appointment when illnesses develop in between yearly visits.

• Make sure your child gets plenty of sleep. Aim for nine to 13 hours a night, depending on their age.

2019-2020 Utica Agricultural Education Program and FFA Chapter

The Utica Agricultural Education Program never really slows down, even in the summer months. During the summer, Mrs. Neff conducted supervised agricultural education visits, and students attended FFA camp, as well as participated in the Hartford Fair. Most students had at least one project in the FFA building at the Hartford Fair, for a total of 120 projects entered. Several students chose to exhibit their animals through FFA, as well. We also participated in the Hartford Fair FFA Challenge and placed 1st at the event! August was an exciting month outside of Hartford Fair, because we found out about American FFA Degree recipients and National Agriscience Fair Qualifiers. This year we had two American FFA Degree recipients and two Agriscience Fair Qualifiers.

For the agricultural education classes, this was the 2nd year of offering middle school courses for 7th and 8th graders. The course this year focused on food science. This is the first year that courses have been offered for 6th graders, and the focus has been on a broad look at what agriculture is and different agricultural industries and careers. High school students are enrolled in one of three courses: Introduction to Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources (AFNR); Plant and Animal Science; or Natural Resources.

In FFA this year, our first trip was to Farm Science Review. We also attended the subdistrict soils CDE (Career Development Event), where students who were interested in the contest or who were enrolled in AFNR or Plant and Animal Science were able to attend, since we were learning about soils in class. Our Ag soils team did very well- we were 1st at the Subdistrict Contest and 2nd at the District Contest. This was a first time for the chapter in several years—at least five years, but most likely more than that— to qualify for the State Contest. Amanda Annett placed 1st at the District Contest. The other three qualifiers were Emily Hill, Kenneth Davenport, and Abby Paxton. At the State Contest, these students placed 30th out of 49 teams.

Other fall highlights have been participating in local events, such as the Homecoming Parade and PALs. PALs is when our students go up to Utica Elementary after school and conduct lessons about agriculture with students who are in the SACC program. Five of our officers were able to attend the Ohio Legislative Leadership Conference and learn more about how lobbying and how government legislation works. These officers were: Rachel Dickson, Amanda Annett, Emily Hill, Abby Paxton, and Hadley Rameriz-George. We also attended the Ohio State University Men's Hockey Game with over 40 students and got ready for the National FFA Convention. The school was able to conduct a send off for Abby Paxton, who was one of our qualifiers for the National FFA Agriscience Fair.

Our other National FFA Agriscience Fair qualifier was Trina Orr, a 2019 graduate. To prepare for their judging, both ladies went through multiple mock interviews and even attended the Ohio FFA Finalist Frenzy to practice. We headed out to the National FFA Convention at the end of October with six other high school FFA members: Autumn Drumm, Amanda Annett, Kathryn Ramseyer, Lindsay Gray, Emily Hill, and Shelby Thompson. While attending National Convention, we toured Jungle Jim's and Tuttle Orchards, attended the Career Show, various sessions, some workshops, and the shopping mall. We found out that Trina placed 8th with a gold rating in her division and category. Abby placed 8th with a silver rating. We also celebrated graduates Joshua Dickson and Courtney Smith for receiving their American FFA Degrees. Only 1/2 of 1% of all FFA members receive this high honor.

Moving into late fall/early winter, we participated in the subdistrict job interview and food science CDE's. We helped the FFA alumni host their Annual Toy Show. We participated in the District Food Science CDE and placed 3rd, one place short of moving on to state. These team members were: Kenneth Davenport, Lindsay Gray, Allie Burgess, Montanna Moran, and Georgia Gamble. Lindsay Gray placed 4th, Rachel Dickson placed 4th, and Hadley Ramirez-George placed 2nd in the District Job Interview Contest in their respective age divisions. We also had our largest fundraiser of the year, the annual fall sale and beat our goal by \$8.00. We hosted one of several Ohio FFA Association Leadership Nights and had over 50 FFA members in attendance from seven different schools. We asked for members to donate canned food items or money to attend and were able to support the Utica Food Pantry with the donations we received.

Things haven't slowed down as we have moved into the new year! This time of year focuses on award applications. Once all i's are dotted and t's are crossed, we should have two State FFA Degrees, two American FFA Degrees, five proficiency award applications, two Star Awards, and one officer book move on to regional and state judging. We have also managed to fit in a brand new CDE (brand new for us and Ohio FFA) called Ag Biotechnology. We are still waiting on results. Kenneth Davenport, Montanna Moran, Georgia Gamble, and Kathryn Ramseyer were able to qualify for this state contest.

We still have lots of events coming up! We are moving into our Spring CDE season, where students have the chance to compete in agronomy, equine, general livestock, milk quality and products, nature interpretation, poultry, and wildlife CDE's. We have already been practicing for Ag Sales and public speaking events, as well as Farm Business Management. All students enrolled in AFNR will be taking the Greenhand Quiz CDE before long! Soon we will be conducting our Strawberry Sale, submitting our agriscience fair applications, holding our banquet, and attending State Convention. We hope to participate in the Velvet Ice Cream Parade festival, and then it will be summer. Before you know it, there will be more SAE visits, summer camp, the Hartford Fair, and a new school year!





Once again we will be using the One Call Now messaging system for parent notification of school delays, cancellations and other information. From the North Fork homepage just follow the link under the parents tab to update your information.

CLOSE?? DELAY?? What should we do?

When bad weather affects the area, we make the decision to open/close schools, or modify the school day schedule based upon a careful analysis of all relevant factors. *Some* of these factors are:

- * Information on road conditions from transportation staff and local law enforcement. Careful consideration is given to the most dangerous roads in the district; they can be treacherous, even if your street looks clear.
- * Amount of accumulated snow and/or ice
- * Is precipitation expected to continue throughout the day?
- * Temperature and wind chill
- * Building conditions such as whether there is electricity and heat
- * What other districts are doing



News from Utica Middle School

Utica Middle School has completed the first semester and moved quickly into the start of the second semester. With the beginning of the new semester, we had a few changes to help our students in pursuit of their academic success and improve the climate within the school. One of the changes included balancing the lunch periods so that students did not feel so crowded in two of our lunches. In the process we also took students who were in large study halls during lunch periods and put them into an academic assist period with a teacher. Most of the teachers have academic assist periods that have 14 – 18 students in each. This will allow the teachers to help the students with work they are struggling with.

We continue to work to improve the learning environment and make it a positive and safe place to be. The second edition of the Redskin Rumble was on January 24th. We began the day honoring our top academic students during the honor roll assembly that the public was invited to. For the remainder of the day, students were involved in a variety of activities that allowed them to celebrate their good behavior during the second nine weeks. We have also had two more sets of students of the month. For November, they were Makenna Wilson, Mason Bowen, Alexa Gosnell, Wyatt Cullop, Nevella Bralley, and Jacob Bartlett. For December/January, it was just announced last week that Katie Reed, Koen Fischer, Abby Dickson, Connor Garee, Emma Hannah, and Kaden Miller were our students of the month.

The middle school is also proud to announce that we are joining together with the Licking County Prosecutor's office and Richmond Justice Initiative (RJI) to be the first school in the state of Ohio to present RJI's program "Prevention Project." This program is to help our students have a strong understanding of what to watch out for to avoid human trafficking. In "Prevention Project," students will receive 6 lessons over their 3 years in middle school on what human trafficking is all about and how to avoid it. Mr. Wilhelm and Mr. Hartley both feel very strongly about protecting our students and giving them as much information as possible to help protect themselves.




