Tidbits from the Treasurer

Did you know...

- The district will be replacing EZPay, the online lunch and fee payment system with PaySchools. The system will be more user friendly and will automatically update based on its interface with all state software. More information will be coming soon!
- The Ohio Department of Education received approval to offer free breakfast and free lunch to all students attending schools on the national school lunch program through the entire 2021-2022 school year.
- Otica Elementary's parking lot was completed last summer at a cost of \$175,588. Newton Elementary's parking lot will be publicly bid this spring for this summer's paving project.
- The State approves a new budget every two years. The 2021-2022 school year marks the beginning of a new bi-annual budget. Currently, hearings in the Senate Primary and Secondary Education Committee are focusing on HB110, the Fair School Funding Plan (FSFP). The FSFP is a rational, transparent and fair system for funding schools. This funding is based on per-student costs and where the student is educated. The base cost are 60% for direct classroom instruction (teachers), 15% for instructional and student support (guidance, co-curriculars), 20% for building leadership and operations and 5% for district leadership and accountability. If HB110 is approved, this will be the first funding formula since the 2018-2019 school year.
- The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act and the American Response Plan (ARPA) Act provided the district with the Elementary Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds (ESSER) I, II and III. A comprehensive plan for the use of these funds is being developed.

Warm Weather

As the warm weather arrives, please remind the students to bring their own water bottle to have throughout the day. We now have two water bottle filling stations in the middle school.

Also, please make sure students are dressing properly and following the dress code that is in the handbook. Here is a brief overview of what is expected.

- 1. Hats, bandanas, headgear, bare midriffs, pants containing holes higher than five inches above the knee, sleepwear, including blankets and slippers, non-prescription sunglasses, spaghetti-strap tank tops (must be a minimum of two inches width), see-through garments, or revealing shirts or blouses, are **<u>not</u>** permitted.
- 2.Tight fitting shorts (spandex, or similarly snug-fitting-shorts, etc.) are prohibited.

- 3. Sleeveless tops should be closed armed, in good taste and have sides that cover the torso. Tops and bottoms must overlap at all times, including when arms are raised with no midriff showing.
- Shorts, dresses and skirts may be no shorter than five inches above the knee. Pants and shorts are to be worn at the waistline.


2nd Grade Hands-On Learning

Students in Mrs. Morey's class have been busy learning and reviewing sight words while playing hockey, bowling, baseball, and even swatting flies. They also have been practicing their math facts while doing the limbo.



Mrs. Morey's class recently had a 'PIE day' to learn and remember three main reasons an author can choose to write: to persuade, to inform, to entertain. Together, those three types of writing spell PIE!

Her students helped describe the difference between each of the 3 kinds of writing and shared examples of each. They helped complete an anchor chart. Then they reviewed various texts they have studied together in class and worked on identifying the author's main purpose for each using their **PIE** pans. REMINDER - Immunization Requirements

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The State of Ohio changed the immunization requirements for **7th** and **12th** grade students effective a few years ago. Please contact your child's pediatrician or your local health department as soon as possible, as proof of these immunizations is required for school attendance, and an updated immunization record needs to be on file with the school nurse. To request a waiver, please contact the building secretary or school nurse, Jennifer Wygle. jwygle@northfork.k12.oh.us

7th grade: Tdap vaccine (to protect from Tetanus, Diphtheria & Pertussis) and Meningococcal vaccine (to protect from Meningitis)

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12th grade: Meningococcal vaccine (to protect from Meningitis)

If the student received a Meningitis vaccine before the age of 16 years, a second dose is required for school attendance in 12th grade. If student received the first dose of Meningitis vaccine at the age of 16 years or older, only one dose is required for school attendance in 12th grade.
