Animal Lovers and Nature Enthusiasts

Mrs. Morey's second-grade class has completed two projects so far this year for our community and they are in the process of completing their third one for May.

In January, her students designed and built various cat toy boxes and some cat wands. Fourteen of the cat toy boxes were sent home to families that requested them. Nineteen cat toy wands and some additional cat toy boxes were donated to Knox County's Humane Society. By the end of their first project, her class expressed that they would love to make toys for dogs next. They began the planning process for their next community project.







Her students began to collect donated materials needed for their second project. Once they collected enough materials, they began to learn how to braid and make knots. They worked together to help each other make several rope/throw toys for dogs. On Valentine's Day, Mrs. Morey's class was able to give away 17 of their hand-made rope/throw toys to families that requested them. Many more dog toys were handed out to others within the community. Her class was able to make a total of 41 rope/throw toys for dogs.

Mrs. Morey's class is now working on their final class project. They will begin to work on creating a StoryWalk experience for not only the students at Utica Elementary, but also for the community to enjoy. During this StoryWalk experience, people participating will go on a little hike up a hill to read a children's book that will be broken down into one to two pages at a time with some student made questions and ways to make connections after each page. Their goal is to have this project completed and displayed for the community to enjoy sometime during the month of May. Their ultimate goal with their final project is to promote literacy and exercise in an engaging, fun way that families can enjoy doing together.

After School Engagement - Math Club, Science Club and our Student Lighthouse Team

The Utica Elementary Math and Science Clubs for 4th and 5th grade students, are a monthly gathering of kids who enjoy elements of mathematics and science that we don't always get to examine during class.

Math Club - Each year they participate in puzzles, activities and the annual Pi Day celebration in March. This year, students did the planning for the final meeting and decided they wanted to build a structure with a variety of materials. The club is always full and always fun!









Science Club - Some of the fun activities in Science club this year included making tie-dye shirts and slime. A big hit was dissecting owl pellets.

Student Lighthouse Team - Our leadership team is comprised of third, fourth and fifth grade students. The Student Lighthouse Team members have been working on creating a positive environment within the school. They created surveys to find the three areas that students have the most concerns. They have created positivity signs and no bullying posters to hang in the hallways. Recently they helped run the stations at Literacy Night. They helped make copies, create the posters and put together items for the stations. Their next project, they would like to work on is the noise levels in the cafeteria.
