It has been a very good and busy start to the school year at Utica Middle School. We have introduced the students to **ten new staff members**. ### Leader in Me

Our district-wide initiative *Leader-in-Me* training and execution continues at both Newton and Utica Elementary schools as we collaborated this past week to discuss what we have already accomplished, what we are presently doing, and what we plan to do in the future. We have already implemented weekly *Leader-in-Me* class discussions and activities; use of the common language, as well as, the many visual reminders that are beginning to appear throughout the buildings. The focus of our most recent training was on creating a leadership culture with regards to the environment (physical surroundings, language that is heard, and the how each person feels), shared leadership (both staff and students share in leadership), and leadership events (assemblies, class meetings, family nights, concerts, etc.). Also discussed was Launching Leadership, which focused on the instruction and teaching the 7 Habits with integrated approaches and modeling. We look forward to our future as a *Leader-in-Me* district.

When bad weather affects the area, we make the decision to open/close schools, or modify the school day schedule based upon a careful analysis of all relevant factors. *Some* of these factors are:

- Information on road conditions from transportation staff and local law enforcement. Careful consideration is given to the most dangerous roads in the district; they can be treacherous, even if your street looks clear.
- \* Amount of accumulated snow and/or ice
- \* Is precipitation expected to continue throughout the day?
- \* Temperature and wind chill

- \* What other districts are doing














This year, the initiative is functioning as a "pilot program "for teachers to learn about techniques during district professional development days and testing them in their classrooms with the aid of guided lesson plans and workbooks.

# Calm Classroom

Calm Classroom techniques were utilized in Ms. Franks' Advanced English 12 class at the end of Quarter 1. Below you will find our class findings and overall the experience we had when using calm techniques.



The room was darkened, and students were asked to calm their bodies and minds. Ms. Franks then asked a series of questions, where students reflected and shared their thoughts. A few example questions were:

What causes you stress?

How do you manage stress?

*Why is it important to care about our mental and emotional health?* 

Students had varying answers, but primarily agreed that a stressor that all had was juggling multiple duties at once. Managing school, sports, family & friends, and other extracurricular was taxing. After discussion, it was time to start the exercises. We practiced both techniques and students overall felt calm, relaxed and more at peace with the stress in their life.


