From the Superintendent -

Can you believe we have already made it through the first quarter of the 2022-23 school year. I would like to express my many thanks to all who have made the start of the year so successful. As we continue into the second quarter, we are focusing on our mission to facilitate maximum learning for every student. The District could not achieve improvement without the strong partnership we share with our students, staff and community. I want to thank each of you for doing your part to live our mission.

The District has had a busy and productive nine weeks. Literacy is the top goal this school year. We have made changes to help our students improve in reading and writing. Our task is to catch everyone up because of the loss of education our students had during COVID or when they were on virtual learning. Because of the changes we made, we are seeing improvement throughout each of our grade levels. We have recently completed the beginning school year benchmarking on our students to see where they are at the start of the school year. This will help us to determine the growth they make throughout the remainder of the year.

As we keep the school year and the upcoming activities in mind, we want to continue to stress our desire to provide a safe environment for all of our students. October was anti-bullying month. The "Be an Upstander" program was put into place to teach students how bullying affects others. A special thank you to our guidance counselors for putting the program together. In November the staff will be doing active shooter training. This is completed every three years to ensure all employees know what to do in case of an emergency. Remember, safety is everyone's concern, if you see something or hear anything please let someone know.

Attendance was a major issue for our students last year. We have added a district level attendance monitor to help get students to school. As a reminder for parents, if you need help to get your student to school please call your building so we can focus on what you may need. Please check out the webpage for attendance information if you need some clarification of how attendance is labeled by the courts.

As fall starts to end, the snow and ice of winter will be beginning. If you have not signed up for the OneCall alert system this would be a good time to consider it. The quickest way to be notified of school closings or emergencies is through the OneCall system. We will also have the information posted to our webpage and use the local television and radio stations. If you have made a change in your address or phone number, please notify the building secretaries so these can be updated in our systems. This helps the district to provide information to you quickly.

Thank you all for letting us be a part of the education of your children and for all of the support you have shown us.

What has the ESSER funds done for your district?

North Fork Schools was allotted \$3,496,550.80 in Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief funds (ESSER). These funds were allocated in three different phases with the last phase ending in the 2023-2024 school year. The funds are reimbursed after expenses are paid by the district.

With the ESSER funds the district purchased four buses, replaced the high school chiller (HVAC), added middle school air conditioners and increased the ventilation. Technology infrastructure was increased, laptops and iPads were purchased, and the curriculum has been enhanced. Seven positions, including elementary art, physical education, and music were added to the ESSER budget. Math and reading tutors were also added to assist with learning loss.

What is to come?

Both elementary chillers (HVAC) will be scheduled for replacement. The curriculum and technology enhancements will continue. Positions previously removed from the General Budget will gradually be returned; by removing these positions we were able to increase our cash position and sustain the newly hired positions.

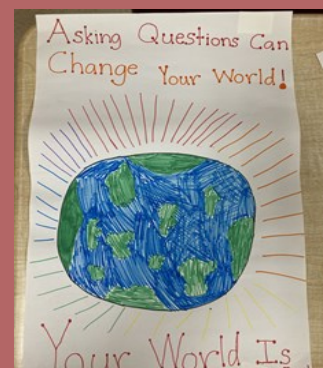
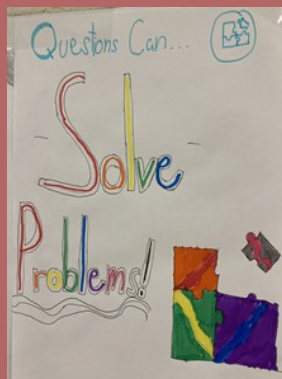
Gifted Update by Jaime Hale, Gifted Intervention Specialist

This year is off to a great start! This is the third year for the first-grade talent development program called Primary Education Thinking Skills (PETS). In the first lessons, students hear the story of Dudley the Detective who teaches us how to do deductive reasoning to come up with one and only one right answer. Teachers have reported that students are applying the skill in other parts of their day and they are remembering to use all of the information so that they, “Don’t jump to conclusions!” In our next lesson, students meet Isabel the Inventor, who looks at things differently to produce lots and lots of ideas. Students get to use creativity and imagination to design a bicycle for a spider and an acorn picker-upper for Isabel’s treehouse. Students receive “brainfocals” which are star-shaped paper glasses so that they can see things differently and creatively. Throughout the year students will learn convergent thinking (deductive logic/analytic), divergent thinking (creative/inventive), visual/spatial perception, and evaluative thinking. Students receive an object to remind them of each thinking skill.

Students get to choose a goal to work on throughout the year which gives them ownership and motivation to achieve their goals. This year ELA students are working on reading and comprehending above grade level texts, analyzing theme and how it interacts with story elements, and conducting and reporting on research projects on a topic of their choice. Math students this year want to focus on solving real world story problems involving area, fractions and decimals, and algebra. We will do several STEM challenges throughout the year in which students will use a design process to create and revise a solution to a problem.

Gifted tip: Have you asked a question today?

Asking questions can be powerful in the learning process. First of all, it gets the brain ready to learn information. Secondly, it keeps us motivated to continue learning. Check out these student-created posters reminding us to ask questions to learn more!

Getting Teenagers to Cooperate is a **Triple P** discussion group program that will help you deal with day-to-day challenges of parenting. It can be very difficult to know when to respect a teen's growing independence and when to insist they do as you ask! It is natural for teens to test limits, but they also must follow reasonable requests. During this program, you will be introduced to positive parenting strategies to help you prevent problems with your teen and to promote cooperation within your family.

Triple P is a research-based, internationally-recognized, multilevel parent support program funded by Licking Memorial Health Systems and supported by Mental Health and Recovery of Licking and Knox Counties and Our Futures in Licking County.

96 percent of parents who have tried some of the **Triple P** strategies have seen an improvement in their child's behavior!





Curriculum Corner


Stephanie Kimpel, Director of Curriculum and Assessment

This fall, our early literacy curriculum was modified and includes two new programs. Foundations, a Wilson Language program, and Heggerty, are programs structured in both phonemic awareness and phonics. Both programs are included in daily instruction and provide a variety of learning strategies to help students master early literacy skills. The goals for our improved phonics program are to ensure that students can make connections with sounds, letters, and how the letters and sounds create words and how the words appear in print. All students in grades K-2 receive this instruction as a whole class with their grade level teacher. An informational parent meeting was held on October 12, 2022, that outlined the district's plan to meet Ohio Department of Education's "Plan to Raise Literacy" for all students. If you would like information from the meeting, please contact your child's school.

How can you help at home? Read with your child as much as possible. Read anything! Newspapers, magazines, books of all types. The more students make connections with print outside of the classroom, the more exposure they receive and can expand both oral and written comprehension.

- **Troubleshooting Reminders ~** If you're having issues with the internet working at home, don't forget to check filtering. After you have the Wi-Fi connected correctly, check the Cisco Filter App. 
 - ➔ Open the app.
 - ➔ Tap "Status" at the bottom of the screen.
 - ➔ Tap "Protected by Umbrella."
 - ➔ Make sure both IPv4 and IPv6 are BOTH **protected**. If one or both are not:
 - Hold both the power button and the home button until the apple symbol appears. Once the symbol appears then you may release the buttons.
 - ➔ After you have restarted the iPad, check to make sure everything is connected correctly. After the hard restart, the Cisco filter app should now show fully protected.

UPDATE ~ Middle School Entry for Child Pickup or Supply Dropoff

As we continue to monitor the safety and security of our students and staff at the middle school, we are making some adjustments to tighten up admittance into the middle school building during school hours. The following process will be followed by the office staff when someone comes to the middle school doors.

1. Outside guests will be asked to identify the student(s) they are here to pick up or drop off supplies for and what their relationship is to the student. The guest may be asked to show a photo ID in some situations. Please have that ready to present to the intercom camera.
2. The office staff will then look up the student information to confirm the guest's ID and relationship with the student.
3. Once approved, the guest will be permitted to enter the building and come to the office to sign the student out or drop off the items for the student.
4. When staffing allows it, an office staff member will come to the door and escort you to the office or your student to the door for added security.

Please know that this is being done to try and maximize the protection of all students and staff, and not to delay you signing your child out. The office staff will work quickly to get through the process and get you on your way as soon as possible. **Thank you!**
