Course Description

It is the student's responsibility to arrange for and complete the necessary work. Work missed through truancy or unexcused absence will be accepted for a maximum 50% credit.

Plagiarism, the act of copying someone else's work or allowing someone to copy your work, or any act of cheating will not be tolerated.

- 1st offense will result in a zero on the assignment, quiz, test, or project with no opportunity to redo it.
- 2nd offense will result in being reported to the office and receiving disciplinary action.

Bathroom Breaks

- Students will receive 3 restroom passes that they will need to keep and give to Ms. Cutrone before using the restroom. Students will also need to sign out and sign back in each time they use the restroom.

Consequences of Misbehavior

*The consequences a student receives will reflect the severity of their behaviors and/or actions

Warning: Students will receive a verbal warning to correct their behavior.

1-on-1: Students will be taken to the hall or will stay after class to discuss their behavior.

Phone Call Home: A student's parent or guardian will be contacted to discuss their behavior if it persists.

<u>After School or Lunch Detention</u>: Students will receive an after school or lunch detention. The student's guardian would need to pick up the student after school.

<u>Office Referral:</u> Students will be sent to the office where the Principal or Vice Principal will decide the best consequence for the action/behavior according to the student handbook, some examples being ISS, OSS, expulsion, etc.
